Yes, yes, I have been slack and haven't published a Bulletin since October.

As many will know, we moved into our new house on the 3rd November and it has been a huge challenge to move from suburbia to acreage. Toni and I have both been busy at work also and she has been taking on the challenge of doing the surgery to remove arteries and veins for heart bypass (a huge challenge in itself.

The challenges of acreage combined over Christmas into heavy flooding in our city. We were fortunate to not be near a river connected creek. Our area floods every time it rains heavily anyway as there is no stormwater system other than creeks. You needed gumboots just to walk on the block and the downpipes wer all blocked etc..

This weekend I have just

finished 9 trailer loads to the local dump/tip with each load being between 500 -650kgs. In the last 3 weeks I have done 24 such loads. Largely this has been the removal of Queen (Cocos) Palms that do not self clean and are very unsightly to allow for the planting of flowering rainforest trees and ferns. I am also growing palm seedlings of more appropriate types.

The roses are still in pots! I have marked an area for a future trial garden that will temporarily be a home for all of the roses we removed from the last house. This area is 12m x 22m and the grass has been poisoned so I can terrace it with the bobcat. The last months have been spent in repair and cleaning up areas for new work to begin.

I have also drawn up plans for a large 6m x 2.7m shadehouse near my golf net. This will be followed down the track with a 20m x 6m poly-tunnel for hybridising under.

I have some website work to do also for the National Rose Society of Australia and for the Australian Rose Breeder's Association. Please go to www.arba.rose.org.au and get inspired to try breeding your own unique roses. I have many seedlings that have survived the last 2 years and look promising.

This edition really just has some pictures and serves to update you on where we are at.

Over the coming months I plan to get back to producing a Bulletin for you that will provide more information on rose growing.

Thank you for your support over the last few years and I hope you enjoy the pictures.
